1. What would make this process a SUCCESS?




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3. What is one BIG idea you have for the community?

Economic Development + Employment

- Shopping center

- Economic development that creates jobs
- Workforce/job training programs



Recreation

- · Recreation centers within development
- More green space
- Community space (i.e. open space, indoor and outdoor recreational spaces)
- A more walkable city



Low-Income Housing

- Elimination of homelessness; Housing for all
- Housing that covers a realistic range of incomes (including rent control options)



Community Engagement / Civic Capacity

- · Planning process should be transparent
- Include young people
- Once constructed, BJ-II should have a board with a percentage of seats reserved for residents



Community Assets

- Preservation of neighborhood cultural social fabric
- Increase opportunities of exposure to the arts
